How Pop Schultz Got Its Name

As told by Arthur Kendrick

Once upon a time, Frank L Chase came from Sutton, NH and started a grocery-meat-goods store in 1906 in the Odd Fellows Block (Henniker Pharmacy block). It was there as F.L. Chase & Son until about 1960. Marge and Eddie Ball bought it from the son, Morris Chase, and renamed it Ball's Market.

Then, in 1966, Allen Goldfarb and Paul Strelzin -- NEC students—bought it and named it Pop Schultz. Everyone wondered why. Then Gary Blint and Brad Routon bought it as Pop Schultz Corp. and kept the name. Later, they moved the operation nearer to the old stone bridge.

Paul Strelzin moved to Texas and taught at a college. He was also an announcer for sporting events. He was a "loud mouth" and was actually thrown out of a game while broadcasting! He's dead now. But his son lives on and is a "big shot" in the NH Judicial department. Allen Goldfarb went on to open Goldies Deli in Portsmouth and it was very good.

According to Brad Routon, Goldfarb and Strelzin, they met at NEC and since Strelzin was the oldest, he was nicknamed "Pop". His last name was tough to remember, so the name "Schultz" was born thus the name "Pop Schultz".


Household: \$25 Individual: \$15 Senior (65+): \$7.50

Items from the Museum

Elizabethan Indenture Paper





Esteemed musician, composer and singer, Henniker resident, Alberto D. Huntoon was also a collector of the esoteric. This Elizabethan indenture paper for Christopher Copleston dated 1533 is an example of some of the oddities Huntoon collected over the years and is now part of our collection at the Henniker Historical Society and Museum. Indenture papers were cut jagged along the edge so that both the parties could retain copies of the indenture and the uneven edge would prove the two went together. Other items in the Huntoon collection include Civil War minie balls, natural history artifacts like unusual stones and birds' eggs, a cup and saucer made from Mt. Vesuvius lava, and even a 123 yr old piece of hardtack from the Spanish American War, plus much more. Many have nothing to do with Henniker in particular, but add to the uniqueness of our collection.

Historic Recipe

While going through our archives, we found a cookbook put out by the Henniker Historical Society in the 1990's. This one was provided by long time member and printer of our newsletter, Bruce Elliott.

WAR CAKE

1 lb seeded raisins 1 tsp nutmeg 1/c shortening ½ tsp salt

2 c. sugar 2 tsp baking soda

1 tsp cinnamon 4 c. flour

Put raisins into two cups boiling water and boil for 15 minutes, drain. Cream sugar and shortening, add cinnamon, nutmeg, salt, baking soda and flour. Mix well. Stir in raisins. Place in 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch loaf ban. Bake at just under 350°F for 55 minutes.

Darling Documents Added to Archives

Thanks to the generous donations of the members of the Henniker Historical Society during the 2020 Fall Giving Campaign, the Society was able to acquire over 100 pages of ledger and property records of the Hon. Joshua Darling from 1820-1842. The documents include financial ledgers, a description of real estate holdings, and advances made to his children.



Cemetery Tour

Henniker has several different historic cemeteries, all with their own stories. In October, HHS held a tour of the Old (Center) Cemetery, located behind the Town Hall. Dressed in period clothing, individuals told the stories of a number of notable Henniker residents buried in the cemetery. Kristen MacLean told the story of deaf/mute Persis Brown Swett; Martha Taylor – Carlos Childs, Susan Fetzer – Louisa Bacon and her 12 children, John Coburn – Revolutionary War veterans Ephraim Goss and Deacon David Clough; Marc McMurphy as Revolutionary War veteran John Proctor; Ellen Reed - Maggie Douglass, mother of Nettie Belle Douglass, first Henniker murder victim; Marek Bennett – Black Revolutionary War veteran Jeremiah Crocker and Beth Spaulding – Henniker's famous Ocean Born Mary Wallace. Despite the chilly weather, well over 100 people came to participate in our fundraiser and learn more about our town. It was deemed a great success. Plans are being made to conduct more such tours in the future. Thanks to all who attended!

Henniker Notable: The Honorable Judge Josiah Darling

Joshua Darling was only 19 years old when he graduated from Dartmouth College in the class of 1794. The oldest of 8 children of Major Timothy Darling and his wife Minnie Chase, he was born in Hopkinton on June 13, 1775. Soon after graduating from Dartmouth, he married Polly Proctor of Chelmsford, Massachusetts in 1795 and moved to Henniker. They built a large house on Western Avenue where Joshua farmed and opened a store. The house was also recorded as an inn and tavern. As late as 1983 the property was known as Darling's Inn.

Joshua was active in town and state politics as a respected citizen of Henniker. He represented Henniker in the NH legislature from 1803 to 1807 and served as State Senator for two years (1811-1812). He is the only Henniker resident ever to have served as President of the NH Senate. In 1816 He was appointed Hillsborough circuit court judge, his decisions rarely overruled by higher courts.

In Henniker he served as a Justice of the Peace in 1799, town clerk for over 17 years, town moderator for 5 years and selectman in 1805 and 1806. When the first post-office was established in 1812, Joshua was appointed post-master. He had to decline as ineligible due to his position as a State Senator. He was on the original committee of three in 1809 to superintend the development of the Henniker district school system. He was one of three who procured the incorporation and drafted bylaws of the Henniker Academy in 1834 and served as one of its first trustees. In the same year, he was appointed to advise the selectman on the specifications and building of the stone bridge. He was also founding member of the Tucker Library.

On the 25th Anniversary of the country's independence in 1811 he presided over the celebration and held a rather large party at his house. It was the one of many Henniker events that he was a 'master of ceremonies.' Judge Darling was active in the Masonic order, also holding a position as Grand Master of the NH Grand Lodge. The Darlings had 11 children, 5 girls and 7 boys, all who lived to adulthood. The Honorable Joshua Darling died of a hemorrhaging stomach ulcer on May 16, 1842. In the *History of Henniker*, Leader Cogswell notes he "was zealous in advancing the best interests of the town his had chosen for his home (p.537)."

The photo of this young WWII soldier, dated 1942 was recently rescued from the dump and brought to the Henniker Historical Society & Museum.
